EID AL ADHA

EID AL ADHA, ALSO KNOWN AS THE FESTIVAL OF SACRIFICE, IS ONE OF the two major celebrations observed by Muslims around the world. It falls on the 10th day of Dhul Hijjah, the final month of the Islamic lunar calendar, and follows the Day of Arafat, a time for fasting, prayer and deep reflection. This Eid also marks the end of Hajj, an annual pilgrimage to Mecca, which is one of the five pillars of Islam.

This holiday honours the story of Prophet Ibrahim (Abraham), whose devotion to and trust in God were unwavering. As part of the tradition, many Muslims take part in qurbani (sacrifice) of an animal such as a sheep, goat or cow. The meat is then shared in three parts, one for family, one for friends and neighbours, and one for those in need. This a reminder for those observing the holiday to deepen the value of charity and community.

Eid al Adha is celebrated over three days with communal prayers, special meals, and time spent with family and friends. Customs may vary across cultures, but the spirit of gratitude and generosity is at the heart of them all.

To everyone celebrating, we are wishing you an Eid Mubarak (a blessed Eid).

Connection to Doctors Nova Scotia's work

Acknowledging Eid al Adha as a religious celebration offers an opportunity to reflect on how healthcare spaces can become more inclusive and responsive to the diverse needs and backgrounds of physicians, staff and patients.
